- 1 This procedure outlines the district's responsibilities for identifying, enrolling, and providing appropriate
- 2 educational support for migrant students, ensuring compliance with federal statutes 20 USCA §§ 6318,
- 3 6391, and 6399, which emphasize parental involvement, educational access, and tailored services for
- 4 migrant children.

5 **IDENTIFICATION**

- 6 The district will use a Migrant Student Survey during the registration process to identify students who 7 qualify as migrant. A student is considered migrant if their family moves across district or state lines for 8 seasonal agricultural work, as defined under 20 USCA § 6399. Families identified as potentially migrant 9 will be referred to the district's Migrant Education Program (MEP). Lision for further acrosses
- 9 will be referred to the district's Migrant Education Program (MEP) Liaison for further assessment.
- 10 Children are determined by statute to be a "migrant child" if:
- the child is not older than 21 years of age,
 the child is entitled to a free public educat
 - the child is entitled to a free public education (through grade 12) under State law or is not yet at a grade level at which the LEA provides a free public education, and
- the child made a qualifying move in the preceding 36 months as a migrant agricultural worker or
 a migrant fisher, or did so with, or to join a parent, guardian, or spouse who is a migrant
 agricultural worker or a migrant fisher, and the child moved due to economic necessity from one
 residence to another residence, and from one school district to another (ESSA Sec. 1309(2)).

18 ENROLLMENT

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- 19 Migrant students will be enrolled immediately, even if the student is missing documentation required for
- 20 enrollment (e.g., proof of residency, immunization records, or previous school records), in compliance
- 21 with the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act. The district will work with the previous school to
- 22 obtain necessary academic records to ensure continuity in the student's education.

23 EDUCATIONAL SUPPORT FOR MIGRANT STUDENTS

- Upon identification, the MEP Liaison will conduct an individual needs assessment (INA) for each migrant student to determine their academic strengths and needs, including assessments for language proficiency, literacy, and academic gaps. Migrant students may be eligible for additional support
- services, such as English as a Second Language programs or special education services if needed, and
- will be provided the same access to curriculum and extracurricular activities as non-migrant students. In
- compliance with 20 USCA § 6391, migrant students will be provided supplemental educational services
- 30 that address academic deficiencies.

31 PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT

- 32 In compliance with 20 USCA § 6318, the district will ensure that effective communication with migrant
- 33 parents is in place. All communications regarding school policies, events, and services will be provided
- in a language that the parents can understand. Translators and bilingual staff will be made available to
- assist with communication during meetings and school events, as necessary.
